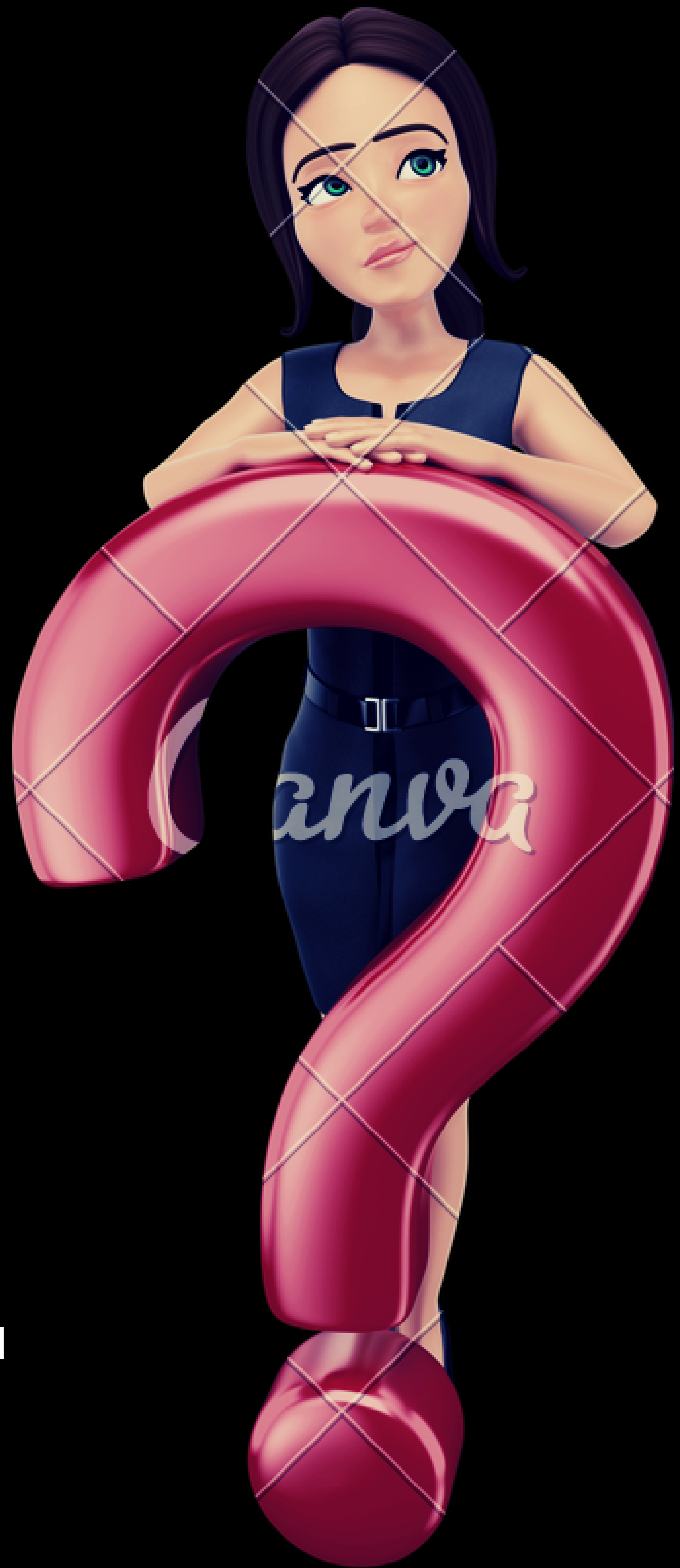




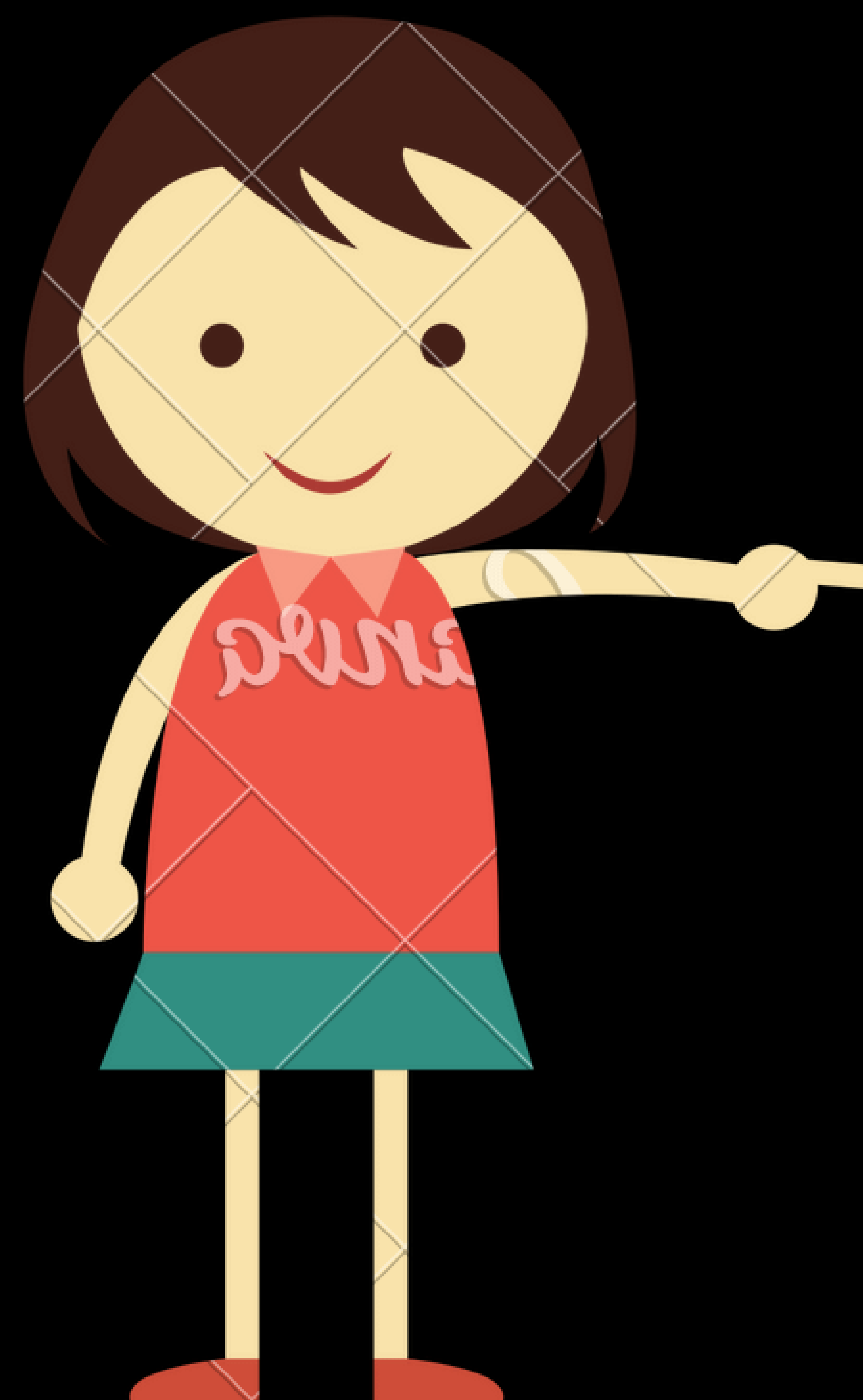
YOU SHOULD NOT BECOME A DATA SCIENTIST

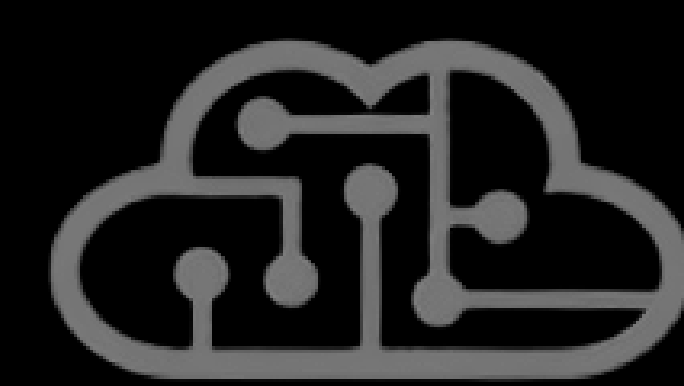

But it might not be the **right one for you.**

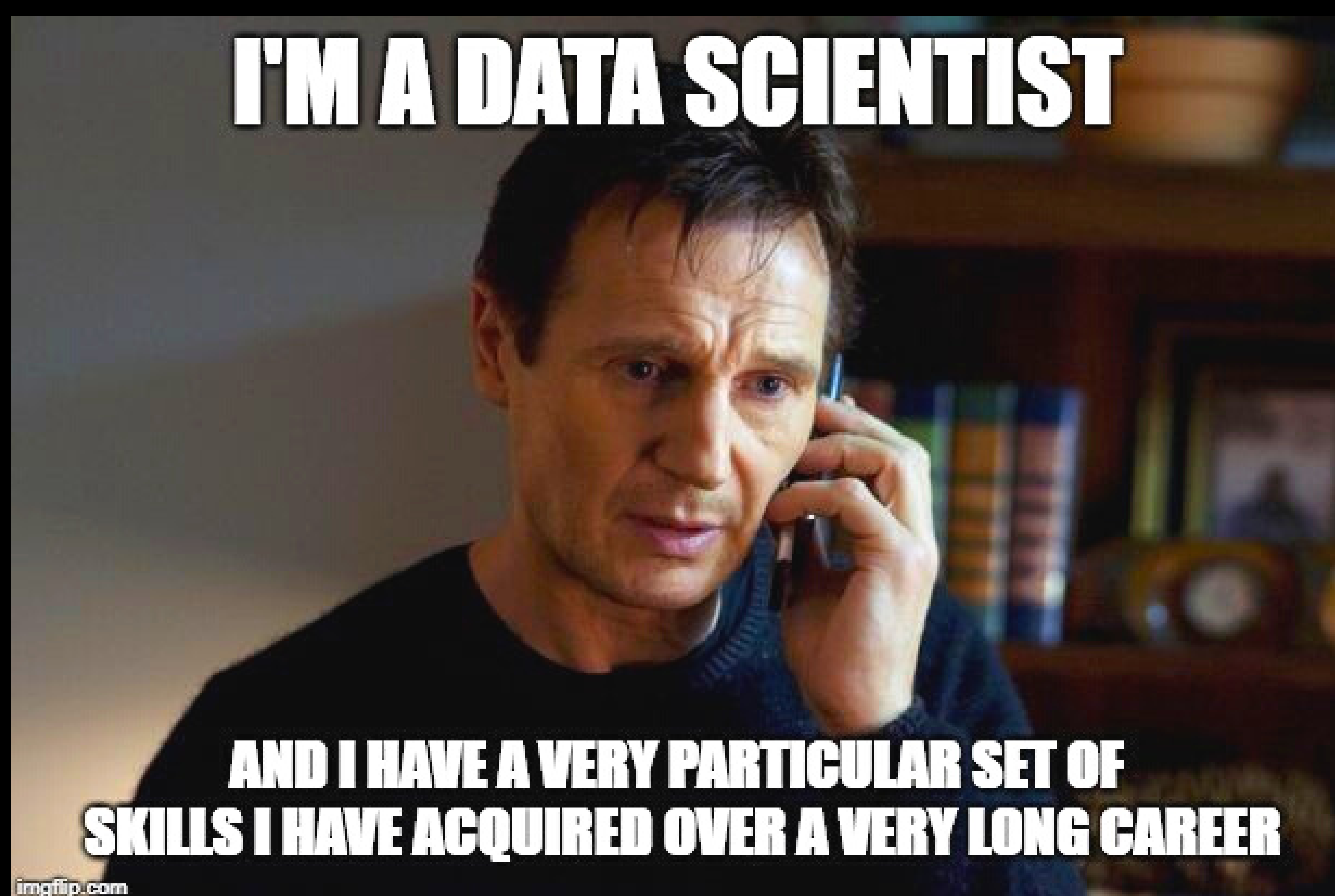


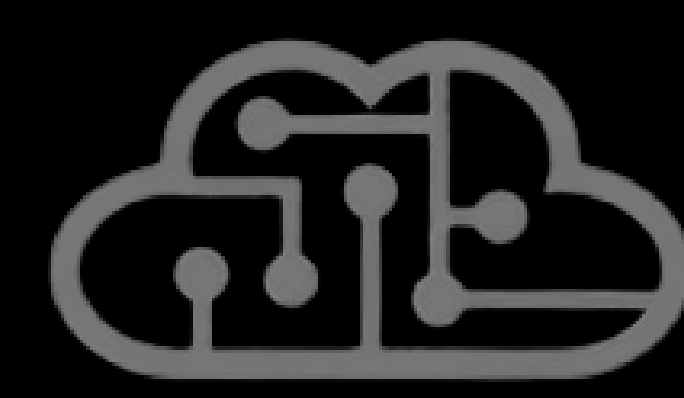


Not willing to learn constantly

And this is where you might end up disliking your data science job as you don't know much about the domain you're working in, but also aren't eager to learn about it because it bores the hell out of you.



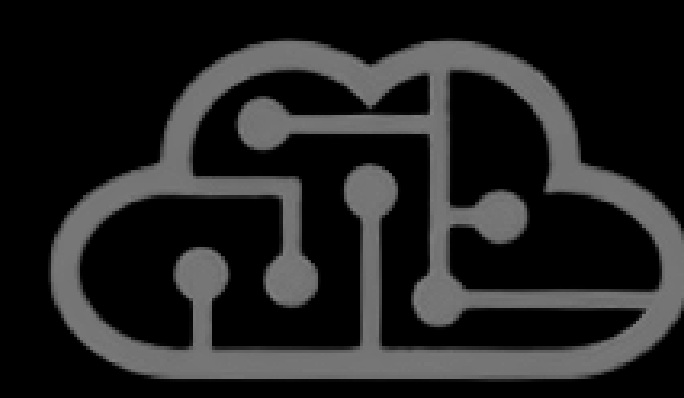


When you don't enjoy what you do
